The Downward Path

Matthew 10:39 "If you cling to your life, you will lose it; but if you give it up for me, you will find it."

"Lent is a solemn season as we travel with Jesus down the path toward the cross of crucifixion and death. The Lenten season reminds us of our common mission to walk the downward path with Jesus toward death. It is the season that invites us to evaluate our own lives and to examine the ways in which we need to "die" with Jesus. It invites us to lose our life in order to find it anew, resurrected with Jesus on Easter morning. The path to resurrection is the downward path, the path of laying down our lives and the path of self-denial. None of us want to walk this path because this pathway takes us in the opposite direction from the path of self-preservation. Yet, Jesus said that if we want to follow Him, if we really want the kind of life He will offer to us, the kind of life He modeled for us in His own life, then we must "deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow Him." (Mark 8:34) Following Jesus will lead us all to the cross, and will lead us all to the place of death. That is the downward journey of Lent. It is the season that invites us to come, to enter in, and to follow Jesus on his journey towards the cross. Genesis 50:20 "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives."

But I read the other day that researchers have identified chemicals in the venom of the Peruvian Green Velvet Tarantula that they believe will lead to more effective pain killers with less addictive side effects. Isn't it amazing that things in nature designed to hurt can actually be used to take pain away. The Bible tells the remarkable story of Joseph, a young man sold into slavery by his own brothers, but who ends up rising to a position of great power and influence. I hope you will take the time just to read the story of Joseph in Genesis 37-50. Many years after the betrayal of his brothers, Joseph spoke to them and said, "What you did to me, you meant it for evil, but God used it for good." Misery Is A Choice

Philippians 4:11 "...for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances."

One of the secrets of learning how to find contentment in this life is to avoid self-pity. Have you ever had a pity party, a bad case of the woe-is-me? I think we understand the feeling of the little girl who fell and skinned her knee. She ran to her mom and dad to show the full extent of the injury and to get some TLC. They appropriately showed concern, put a band-aid on it, and sent her back to play. Sometime later they found her in her room crying. They asked if her knee still hurt, and she said, "No, but when I hurt it, you and momma didn't feel sorry enough so I am up here feeling sorry for myself." Have you ever done that? Life is difficult. You get skinned up and sometimes feel like you always get the short end of the stick and life is unfair, and that you are being singled out for misery. If we can't get anyone else to feel sorry for us enough, we will feel sorry for ourselves. Self-pity, though, will drag you down to the depths of despair. You can't afford to stay in self-pity for very long. God has given us a lot of good gifts, and one of His greatest gifts is the gift of choice. You don't get to choose your circumstances, but you do get to choose what your attitude and response is going to be in your circumstances. You can choose to feel sorry for yourself and whine your life away, or you can choose joy. My favorite quote is, "Pain is inevitable, but misery is optional." The apostle Paul was in prison, but out of the prison he wrote, "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstance." He didn't choose self-pity, he chose Christ, and He discovered in choosing Christ he was choosing contentment. I encourage you to choose Christ and not self-pity.
