Joel 2:12-13 "Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful."

Do You Believe?

Titus 2:11-12 "For the grace of God has appeared that offers salvation to all people. It teaches us to say "No" to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in this present age."

The movie, Do you Believe, is about 12 people who are confronted with the cross of Jesus Christ. The story begins with an old street preacher asking a young man if he believes in the cross of Jesus Christ. The young man, the pastor of a local church, says, "I'm a pastor." The street preacher responds, "That isn't what I asked. I asked, 'Do you believe in the cross of Jesus Christ?" And with passion, the street preacher continues, 'The cross is where Jesus loved you. The cross is where Jesus shed His blood for you and died. The cross is where Jesus forgave your sins and gave you His life - new life. And if you REALLY BELIEVE in the cross of Jesus Christ – the cross is where Jesus NOW DEMANDS something out of you.' With increasing fervor the old man shouts, 'You can't believe in the cross without a response! Now, DO YOU BELIEVE in the cross of Jesus Christ?!" We should all be troubled by this question. Is God Ok with our lives? We are Christians. We read the Bible – go to church. Yet, are our lives living up to the demands of the cross of Christ? Jesus gave EVERYTHING on the cross. How are we responding? Is Jesus demanding MORE of our lives, but we have gotten comfortable in our 'enough-ness?' FIGHTING BY PRAYING

Ephesians 6:10-18 (NIV) "10 Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. 11 Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. 12 For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. ¹³ Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. 14 Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, ¹⁵ and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. ¹⁶ In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. ¹⁷ Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. 18 And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. PEOPLE FIRST

James 2:8-9 "If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing right. But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers."

A few months ago, we shared the story about the sweet birth announcement from friends regarding the birth of their son, Walt, who was born with Down's Syndrome. A friend recently asked Liz, "What can our family do to be the best with Walt?" Liz first cried, thankful that there would be people in their lives who would make every effort to learn how to love Walt well. Later, Liz asked her friend to use People First Language with Walt. Liz had learned about People First Language while working at a children's summer camp. People First Language teaches a person how to talk about and talk to Walt and other children and adults with special needs. It puts the person first then their diagnosis. For example, Walt is a child with Down syndrome. NOT Walt is a Down syndrome child. People First puts Walt as a child first then his diagnosis. This way of talking allows for the person to be valued as a person, not as his diagnosis. God wants us to put all people first. And God wants Christians to ask Him, "What can I do to love this person well?" and God would tell us, "Use People First Language." See them first as a unique person – made in My image – see them first as people – before you see their skin color, their clothes, their tattoos, or their income. Value them because I made them."

TUESDAY

MICROTUGS

Isaiah 40:8 "The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures"

Ken Roach introduced me this week to something I did not know. Engineers at Stanford University have designed tiny robots which they have called microtugs that can drag objects hundreds of times their weight. A nine gram microtug, for example, can pull a 2.2 lb load vertically up glass. That is equivalent to a human climbing a skyscraper while carrying an elephant. The secret of the microtug's pulling power is their sticky feet. If you have ever played tug-o-war, you know it is not how strong your arms are but how much traction you can get with your feet. If you feel like you are slipping and sliding and getting pulled down by the weight of this life, don't focus on increasing your own strength. Focus on planting your feet firmly in the word of God. Isaiah reminds us that even if everything else around us is falling, the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of God endures forever." When your feet are set by faith, you can be like a microtug and you can pull more than you had ever imagined possible."
